#### Being Known Student Wellbeing

At St Paul's, student wellness is the focus and core purpose of each school day. We aim to understand the 'whole' child to create a meaningful connection between our students and staff.

Every student has access to support staff, the school counsellors/ psychologists and Chaplaincy staff to provide balance for our students to thrive, both as learners and as individuals. We understand that wellbeing is dynamic and our program changes to meet the unique needs of students.

We cultivate a safe, caring environment where each student is comfortable and can strive to achieve their personal best.

From the very young learners in the Early Learning Centre (ELC), to the Year 6 students who are entering adolescence, St Paul's students are provided with an exciting and stimulating learning environment. We provide a comprehensive skillsbased curriculum and an engaging and interesting co-curricular program that nurtures each and every student.

To give children physical freedom in their activities, the School Sports Uniform is worn from Pre-Kinder through to the end of Year 2.

Staff work together to ensure that all students feel valued, and that the learning environment we offer is positive and caring.

The individual care of students remains at the forefront of each school day. Getting to know the 'whole' child enables staff to meet their individual needs and assist them to thrive.

#### **Classroom Teachers**

Students spend the majority of their school day with their classroom teachers, who quickly discover how each student learns, socialises and behaves. They are well-placed to identify any issues or concerns.

Classroom teachers are always available by email or by making an appointment to discuss your child's academic, social or emotional wellbeing.

#### **Growing With Your House**

We are known for creating a sense of family amongst our students and staff through our house system.

Our school has four houses which form the foundation of interhouse activities and competitions. Each student is allocated to a house, with members of the same family placed together.

Our houses are: Burgundy, Navy, Emerald and Gold.

#### **Play Is The Way**

Our school utilises the *Play is the Way* program from the ELC through to Year 6. *Play is the Way* is a social and emotional learning methodology using physically interactive games and activities, five guiding concepts, an empowering self-reflective language and six key virtues that form a pathway to empathy.



### **Our partnership with parents**

#### Communication Partnerships

We work in partnership with the student, teacher and parents – and are committed to providing proactive and responsive communication to parents. We recognise that parents are the first educators in their child's life and continue to support and provide knowledge for the development of their future lives.

#### **Daily Updates**

Communication with parents occurs through the diary system or by direct emails or phone calls to ensure that parents and carers are kept informed as key contributors to their child's education.

#### **MyStPauls Portal**

Our learning management system, MyStPauls, provides constant information, calendar dates and information for parents to support their child's learning experience. It is useful to regularly check our Junior School Campus page for valuable information and access posts about our classroom programs, exciting learning activities and photos of our wonderful students.

MyStPauls also provides access to our continuous online reporting, giving parents and carers regular updates and feedback about how each student is progressing.

During any periods that require online learning, we have proven ourselves adept at ensuring student learning continues seamlessly via MyStPauls and Microsoft Teams.

#### Grammarian

Every fortnight we publish an online school newsletter 'The Grammarian' which contains information regarding upcoming events and opportunities available to you and your child. The newsletter is a resource for our community to celebrate special events and personalised learning achievements.

#### **Teacher Contact**

All parents are welcome to contact our teachers and leadership team, we do however recommend booking an appointment if you wish to privately speak to one of our team for a considerable amount of time.

#### Family Involvement Visiting The Classroom

Parents and carers are welcome to visit the primary school throughout the year.

In accordance with our school policy, parents participating in school activities must provide the school with a current Working with Children's Check, have completed the school's Child Safety Modules and undertaken a 'Parent Helper' briefing.

#### Going Beyond Child Safety

We are committed to providing a safe, caring environment for all learners to feel valued, celebrated and respected. Our students, staff and parents work in unison to provide a learning journey where each child is always safe and we have wellembedded structures to ensure this.

### **Getting ready for Prep!**

#### How to Prepare 7 Steps to Transition

Starting school is a significant and exciting milestone in a child's life. At St Paul's, the extended Prep Transition Program encourages children to be eager to start school, creates enjoyable memories and provides an excellent beginning to their learning journey.

In addition, our Prep staff spend some of their planning time in the Early Learning Centre and external Kindergartens, where they mix with and get to know the students they will be teaching the following year.

#### **1. Information Session**

An Information Session is held for families in October. During this session, the teachers will provide a 'Handbook' that will include information about the School, subjects and tips to read over the Christmas break, to help make the transition to school a little smoother.

#### 2. Play Afternoons

You and your child are invited to two play afternoons in October where your child can become familiar with the Prep environment. These informal sessions allow children to talk to Prep teachers and play with each other, all in a nurturing friendly environment.

#### 3. Transition Days

The Transition Days span four weeks during November and early December. On these days your child will participate in specialised activities that are designed to bring out their confidence as they transition to school. They will begin to develop an understanding of what takes place during a school day, making the thought of change less worrisome.

During the first session, students are presented with their special hats at an official 'Hat Ceremony' and parents are invited to stay for morning tea. This is a great opportunity to meet the parents of other Prep-age students. An orientation is held as the final transition activity and students spend the day at school.

#### 4. Buddy Program

The Buddy Program commences during transition and continues into Term 1. The Years 3 to 5 Buddies are a friendly mentor to our young learners as they start school. Completing a variety of activities together, Buddies forge friendships, connections and memories that last for years to come.

#### **5. Personalised Meeting**

In December you will have the opportunity to have a one-on-one discussion with your child's Prep teacher. Here, teachers will learn more about your child to understand them better and determine any underlying needs as they make the big step to primary school. This personalised meeting also allows our teachers to provide you with important information about starting Prep and help to alleviate any residual fears your child may have about the change.

#### 6. Early Finish

Prep students finish at 3:00 pm during their first few days of school, leaving prior to the rest of the student body and allowing them to establish some routine before merging with older students.

#### 7. Rest Day Wednesdays

Within the first four weeks of the school year starting, Wednesdays are a rest day and children are invited to come in for an assessment on one of these days. This assessment provides our educators with useful insight and knowledge about your child.



### Prep - all about learning

#### Strong Foundations Curriculum

At the heart of St Paul's are students' health and happiness. We foster a love of learning in our students to develop their curiosity through an engaging Prep curriculum, specifically designed to meet the needs of each individual learner.

The Prep year is crucial in building strong foundations for the rest of the primary years. Accordingly, our educational programs at these levels focus on literacy and numeracy skills and educational support is provided each day within the Prep classroom.

Social behaviours such as courtesy, manners and respect for others and our environment are integral features of our teaching programs. Independence is fostered in learning, joining in activities and making friends.

We recognise that students bring with them a wealth of experiences and learning from which they develop an understanding of how the world works. These understandings become a starting point for the teaching and learning process. Our role is to encourage effort, and to challenge and build upon these skills and understandings.

#### A Love Of Learning In The Classroom

We foster a love of learning in our students and develop their curiosity through an engaging Prep curriculum, specifically designed to meet the needs of each individual learner

Prep children are immersed in a diverse range of studies in the classroom which cater to their individual needs and interests. Each day is divided into six lessons, with breaks for recess and lunch and the curriculum immerses children in Literacy, Numeracy and Humanities/ STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics).

Our curriculum provides students with the opportunity to learn through exploration in both indoor and outdoor spaces, fostering a lifelong love of learning among our students.

#### **Building Connection**

Commencing at transition, our Buddy Program partners Preps with Year 3–5 students who support their transition into primary school. The Buddies continue to strengthen their relationships through Year 1 and

Year 2, supporting your child's transition into primary school.

In addition to providing company and creating supportive connections, Buddies help your child quickly establish a sense of belonging in their new environment. Buddies offer encouragement and a friendly face in the playground that often evolves into a very special bond.

All students participate in Chapel services and assemblies, broadening their experience and providing an understanding of their place in the school.

### **Specialist Subjects**

#### Beyond the Classroom Physical Education

Each week, students participate in a wide variety of activities. Our Health and Physical Education program focuses on the importance of a healthy lifestyle and physical activity in the lives of our students. It promotes the development of motor skills and movement competence, health-related physical fitness and sport education.

Engaging in physical activity, games and sport contributes to a sense of community and social connection.

Athletics and swimming carnivals are enjoyed by students from Prep to Year 12, and students in Years 3 through to Year 6 have the opportunity to represent the School at Inter-School competitions.

Students can also participate in after school sports such as netball, indoor soccer and basketball. Through parent support we have a wide range of age groups who compete for the school in local competitions.

#### Library

All students attend one library session each week. Students learn about authors and illustrators as well as the parts of a book and different sections of the library. Students in Years 3 to 6 are able to take advantage of the library's literature appreciation resource and are taught the efficient and effective use of the computer catalogue system.

All students at the Junior School are encouraged to discover different books and genres, and are inspired to develop a love of reading.

Students can also participate in The Quiet Club during lunchtime where they can read, research or play educational games.

#### **Visual Arts**

The Visual Arts program provides opportunities for children to experience, develop, represent and understand ideas, emotions and values. They learn to take risks, be imaginative, question, explore, practise and refine techniques.

Within the Visual Arts program, your child will have the opportunity to experiment with a range of mediums and create a variety of 2D and 3D artworks. By exposing students to a vast assortment of art materials, they have an opportunity to discover and pursue their own creativity and flair. An art extension program is also available to children displaying a keen interest and talent in art.

#### **Performing Arts**

Each year level from Prep to Year 6 has a weekly session in Performing Arts. There are also Performing Arts Ensembles and Clubs to which the students can belong. These groups perform at assemblies and in alternating years, all students from Years 3 to 6 are involved in the Musical Production or our Performing Arts Concert.

Students in Year 2 undertake a semester in our strings program including the provision of an instrument and tuition, and in Year 5 students choose a brass or woodwind instrument as part of the Band program which runs across one semester.

There are opportunities for students to perform at school soirees, events or Eisteddfods. Students are also able to access private music tuition across a wide range of instruments.

#### Japanese Language

The study of a second language is considered important at St Paul's and assists students with a smooth transition to Secondary School where LOTE (Language Other Than English) is taught as a compulsory subject.

From Prep to Year 2, our Japanese Language studies focus on broadening students' horizons by developing an awareness of another culture and highlighting our expectations around understanding diversity and difference.

In Years 3 to 6, students undertake Japanese Language lessons every week.

#### **Christian Studies**

Our Christian Studies classes enable students to engage in values-based learning activities, which develop their sense of belief in themselves and a responsibility to their community. Our School's Christian ethos allows students to engage in messages of hope in a respectful and joyful environment.



### Each child is unique

#### Enrichment & Support Personalised Learning

We recognise that every student is an individual, with skills and abilities that are unique to them. While support and enrichment occur in every classroom, some students may benefit from a greater amount of support or differentiation in pace, level, and content from the regular curriculum and others may have strengths that are important to identify and foster. Regardless of your child's needs, we will encourage and support them in their learning in every way possible.

Through early and systematic assessment processes, students' individual capacities are identified early in the year to offer maximum benefit. The decision about which students access support and enrichment programs is a joint process between classroom teachers, specialist staff and parents. It is intended that students utilise the programs over varying periods of time, depending on their individual needs and circumstances. The objective is to ensure the individual needs of every child are catered for, that learning is personalised to them, and that they are given every opportunity to not only achieve their personal best but to thrive.

#### **Endeavour Program**

The Endeavour Program aims to inspire and ignite student learning – uncovering and unearthing passion areas of inquiry and investigation. Small groups of students are able to extend and challenge themselves in critical and creative thinking.

Elective options are generated by students, staff and community members. Students select two or three areas of interest to pursue, and these preferences directly shape the content for the semester. Electives run on a semesterly basis, with one hour each week dedicated to deliver a carefully crafted program that encourages rigour, robust discussion and meaningful learning. Creative, critical and reflective thinking skills are explicitly taught and incorporated in each elective, helping to facilitate a common language across the upper years of primary school.

A Student Expo is the culminating event each semester where students share, collaborate and reflect upon their learnings and successes.

An independent service, Club House Boot Camp, offers before and after school care and a school holiday program at each of our campuses.

Operating independently from St Paul's, the service provides care to children aged between four and twelve years of age, utilising our spacious classrooms, playgrounds and facilities.

The before school care program offers care from 6:45am to 8:45am every weekday.

After school care provision offers care from 3:00pm to 6:00pm.

The school holiday program operates every weekday from 6:45am to 6:00pm.
